**Title: Government Relations Services**

**Listed below are the questions (with the answers to follow in color), that were submitted during the open question period.**

## **Responses to the RFP Questions**

- 1. What is the level of funding that CSUS has received over the past five years through federal appropriations (non-competitive grants) and for what projects?*

### Fiscal Year 2003

- SCSU - \$800,000 for the nursing program

### Fiscal Year 2004

- SCSU - \$340,000 to expand nursing education recruitment, diversity and training programs

### Fiscal Year 2005

- Statewide - \$750,000 for a statewide project to enhance teacher workforce diversity, recruitment and retention
- ECSU - \$975,000 to provide education and child development services to the Groton Navy Submarine Base
- WCSU - \$200,000 for the expansion of the Roots and Shoots program
- CCSU - \$100,000 for the Institute for Technology and Business Development

### Fiscal Year 2006

- CCSU - \$500,000 for the Institute for Technology and Business Development

### Fiscal Year 2007

In fiscal year 2007 all earmarks were stripped from almost every appropriations bill at the end of the cycle before those bills went to conference. For that purpose, included here is a list of what was funded in the House and Senate appropriations bills before the earmarks were removed.

- Statewide - Teacher Training and Retention
  - Senate Labor/HHS bill - \$500,000
  - House Labor/HHS bill - \$500,000
- SCSU – Oyster Research
  - House Agriculture bill - \$400,000
- CCSU – Institute for Technology and Business Development

- Senate Commerce, Justice and Science bill - \$500,000
- WCSU – After School Science Education
  - Senate Commerce, Justice, Science bill – soft earmark (no specific dollar amounts were included for projects in the Senate-passed bill. Those amounts were to be added in conference, but as noted early all earmarks were stripped before conference so no dollar amounts were specified.)
- ECSU – Childhood education and development/Groton Submarine Base
  - Authorized in the House Defense authorization bill

Fiscal Year 2008

To date only the Defense appropriations bill has been signed into law by the President. All other bills are pending. Included here is a list of what is currently included in the respective appropriations bills.

- Statewide – Nursing project
  - Senate Labor/HHS bill - \$400,000  
NOTE: In the Labor/HHS conference report, which was vetoed by President Bush, this project was appropriated \$340,000.
- SCSU – Oyster Research
  - House Agriculture bill - \$400,000
- CCSU – Mechanical Engineering/Aerospace Project
  - Senate Commerce, Justice, Science bill - \$150,000

**2. *Is there a particular academic/research area in which CSUS would like to see increased funding?***

The approach we have taken in the last two years is to determine (on an annual basis) the priorities for the universities and the CSU System as a whole. We weigh such priorities with the “climate” in both Hartford and Washington and once the priorities are determined, attempt to leverage our efforts at the State level to maximize federal support. Potential projects in future years include funding to support CSUS programs feeding the State’s workforce shortage areas for nursing and engineering, teacher preparation (including early childhood).

## Request for Proposal (RFP) CSUS-0308 for Government Relations Services

### I. Statement of Objectives and Goals of this Procurement

The Connecticut State University System (CSUS) desires to obtain proposals from experienced and qualified firms to provide the CSUS with government relations services, with federal agencies, the federal administration, and in the U.S. Congress. The specific goals of this procurement are as follows:

1. Assist the CSUS in increasing its current level of federal funding and grant opportunities for academic, instructional, and research activities.
2. Assist the CSUS in developing a long-term strategic plan that will be updated annually, for increasing federal funding opportunities.
3. Provide information and analysis to the CSUS's Board of Trustees, Chancellor, Presidents, administrators, and faculty about federal legislation and regulations that will impact research, instruction, student affairs and other activities that are critical to the universities mission.
4. Assist the CSUS in informing elected and appointed federal officials about the CSUS's academic, instructional, research, community service, and other activities and its established reputation among public universities.
5. Provide information to CSUS on federal legislation that impacts the CSUS.

**II. Background:** The Connecticut State University System (CSUS) consists of four comprehensive universities and a system office. CSUS, serving over 36,000 students, is the largest public university system in the state, and is governed by an 18-member Board of Trustees. The universities are located in urban areas: Central Connecticut State University in New Britain (12,300 students), Eastern Connecticut State University in Willimantic (5,400 students), Southern Connecticut State University in New Haven (12,300 students), and Western Connecticut State University in Danbury (6,000 students).

**Representative Academic, Instructional, and Research Areas**

**Nursing:** CSUS enrolls over 300 students in the baccalaureate nursing program each year at Central, Southern and Western. Given its responsibility to serve the state by educating a new corps of nurses, CSUS would like to develop programs to attract and retain students, develop curricula to accelerate baccalaureate degree programs and increase the diversity of practicing nurses in the state.

**Education:** Central and Southern have initiated Ed.D programs in educational leadership, and Western has begun a doctoral program in instructional leadership. Support for research at the doctoral program level will help consolidate these programs and maximize the impact on the Connecticut PK-12 education system. In addition, further support is needed to expand initiatives in all university education programs to increase the proportion of minority teachers and address shortages in identified secondary education areas. The universities have each successfully piloted programs in these areas, working collaboratively with local priority school districts. University centers and institutes working in the area of education are the Child Care Center, the Early Childhood Learning Center, and the Center for Multicultural Research and Urban Education at Central; the Center for Educational Excellence and the Child and Family Resource Development Center at Eastern; the Child Care Center and the Center for Community and School Action Research at Southern; and the Center for Excellence in Teaching and Learning at Western.

**Energy:** Eastern's Institute for Sustainable Energy is Connecticut's center for research and education about energy conservation and alternative energy sources. Along with its endowed chair, the Institute is providing the state and nation with important energy research, establishing working partnerships and providing essential data to municipalities and local school districts, and developing an undergraduate energy studies curriculum including community workshops in the areas of energy conservation, energy efficiency, and the environmental impacts of energy use. Federal funding to support these activities would be very important to Connecticut's energy conservation and energy efficiency efforts.

**Computer Science:** Computer science programs at CSUS universities will benefit from the establishment of specialized computer laboratories in areas such as pattern recognition, visualization, neural networks, genetic programming, wireless networking, parallel and distributed computing. Much activity is taking place in the area of Web-enhanced teaching and learning at CSUS institutions, with a particularly strong effort in the computer science departments. Support is needed particularly in the areas of programming, curriculum materials, servers, client- and server-side software for Web courseware development. In the area of student retention, funding for knowledgeable lab assistants to provide support is needed. The assistants will allow faculty to dedicate more time to research and curriculum enhancement.

Specific projects in computer science are also in need of support:

- **Computer Information Assurance:** Western has one of the few undergraduate Computer Information Assurance programs in the country, given the nation's need for computer security, additional federal funding could be used to expand this important program.
- **Voice-Recognition Technology:** Southern's Center for Adaptive Technology and Western's Center for Business research are working in the area of voice recognition from the assisted technology and business perspectives. Funding will help accelerate the applications of these technologies in these two areas.
- **Data Mining:** Central's online data mining graduate program is one of the firsts of its kind in the nation. Faculty in the Mathematical Sciences and Computer Science departments apply statistical methodology, machine learning and business intelligence in solving real-world problems, using state-of-the-art software. Funding for applied mathematical research and development can be used to expand the applicability of the program in areas of business, industry and national security.

**Criminal Justice:** University-housed institutes, as well as work being conducted by individual faculty at the universities, are making possible the creation of criminal justice clearing-house information related to forensic technology, the training of criminal justice personnel, the evaluation of criminal justice initiatives, and the advancement of applied research including the interface of the criminology and data warehousing fields. Funding for these initiatives will allow for further integration of multiple academic disciplines as well as fulfill the increased need for services and consultation to many organizations and government.

**Engineering Technology:** Central's Institute for Industrial and Engineering Technology was created in 2001 and it comprises the Center for Technical Training, the Manufacturing Applications Center, the Procurement and Technical Assistance Center, and the Center for Flexible Manufacturing Networks. In close interaction with the growing degree offerings in engineering technology at Central, the Institute is ready to realize its vision to be a focal point of innovation and technical assistance for state economic development. Funding at the newly renamed School of Engineering and Technology is also needed to support rapidly growing engineering programs that respond to critical workforce shortages, support research, curriculum development and assessment, and step up student recruitment efforts.

**Meteorology:** Western offers an accredited program in meteorology leading to the Bachelor of Science degree and a Master of Arts in Earth and Planetary Science, with Meteorology/Climatology option. These are the only licensed meteorology programs in Connecticut, and two of the few existing in the New England region. Sponsored research will enhance scholarship in these programs and will support the Weather Center's efforts within and beyond the university.

**Adaptive Technology:** Southern's Center for Adaptive Technology (CAT) provides technology access solutions for people with visual, physical, and learning disabilities. The main focus of the CAT is to help students with disabilities become independent users of computers and adaptations for the completion of course work. Services are provided to Education, Special Education, and Communication Disorders programs and are in need of expansion with external financial support.

**Biological and Physical Sciences:** Science programs are increasingly demanding resources for research equipment in the biological and physical sciences. Recently approved new programs include master-level programs in genetics, environmental science, information design, and bachelor-level programs. Facilities which came on-line at Western in 2006 and are anticipated at Eastern in 2008 will strengthen the capacity for faculty-student collaborative research, which can have a positive impact on graduates ability to fill high demand industry positions.

**Social Work:** The Department of Social Work at Southern would benefit from the establishment of an on-site clinic that would be used to educate social work students and provide service to the general New Haven community and the university. The clinic would function as a child development and family service agency. Support for facilities, staff and equipment are needed.

**Other Emerging Educational Areas:** CSUS would be receptive to suggestions for other emerging educational areas that have a high likelihood of federal funding and fit within our university's missions and strategic goals.

### **III. Scope of Project:**

#### **A. GENERAL REQUIREMENTS**

The CSUS plans to build upon its current activities in working with Congress, federal agencies and the federal administration to increase federal funding opportunities in key areas of importance to the System, the State of Connecticut, and the nation. The successful firm is expected to provide governmental affairs services, as part of a team approach, which complements the System administration's current activities. Services provided by a firm must supplement, and not duplicate, the efforts of the administration. The firm will share responsibility with CSUS officials in communicating with the members and staff of the Connecticut Congressional Delegation.

#### **Services Required of Firm:**

Assist with the review of the CSUS's academic, instructional and research programs, identifying those which have the greatest potential for increased federal support and assist the System in developing a long-term strategic plan, that will be updated annually, to secure federal funding;

Identify and assist in securing federal appropriations.

Identify and assist in securing federal legislative changes that would create additional opportunities for the CSUS to secure increased federal appropriations and grant awards;

Assist in working with federal agencies and the federal administration to identify, create and secure new federal grant, contract and other funding opportunities;

Seek individuals, groups and institutions with goals similar to those of the CSUS and assist in building coordinated activities whenever advantageous to the;

Develop plans to obtain necessary federal resources;

Analyze and inform the CSUS of contemplated legislative and regulatory changes that may positively or negatively affect programs of interest to the CSUS;

Enhance the CSUS's profile with Congress and federal agencies by arranging opportunities for administrators and faculty to testify before Congressional Committees, meet with key Congressional members and staff, and meet with high-level agency administrators;

Provide written reports at least quarterly to CSUS officials as needed to apprise them of the current status of the CSUS's federal objectives and to coordinate strategy to achieve those objectives;



Provide, upon request after award, an issue-based plan proposal prior to the execution for each project;

Provide such other services and information as the CSUS and the selected firm may agree are necessary to achieve the CSUS's federal objectives.

#### **IV. Vendor Information**

##### **A. Vendor Overview**

Please provide the following:

The references must be relevant to services performed in the last 36 months, and shall include their level of acceptance of those services.

#### **V. Proposal Submission Requirements**

Each proposal shall contain, at a minimum, the following information:

1. A description of how the firm plans to provide federal relations consulting services as set forth in Sections I and III. Include a description of how the firm will work with the CSUS to provide these services.
2. An outline of how the firm will assist in reviewing and assessing the CSUS's academic, instructional, and research programs and identify those which have the greatest potential for increased federal support.

3. A description of what strategies the firm would use to enhance federal funding for six of the representative academic, instructional and research areas listed in Section II. Respondents shall submit a proposed plan for achieving the broadly stated goals in six of the areas. This plan shall include, at a minimum, the strategy, milestones, and goals that represent the firm's best recommendation while achieving a high degree of cost efficiency. After award, the chosen firm may be requested to provide an issue-based plan proposal prior to execution for each project.
4. Describe how the firm will deal with conflict of interest situations, in which the provision of services for another client will be in conflict with either the services provided to the CSUS or the goals of the CSUS.
5. A description of the firm's availability to participate in meetings with CSUS officials in Connecticut and in Washington, D.C.
6. A definitive list of services the firm will provide.
7. Experience:
  - a) A detailed description of similar work performed by the firm and its associates during the past five years. Include specific examples of how firm efforts led to increased levels of federal funding for an institution and projects accomplished during the last two sessions of Congress.
  - b) A description of the firm's prior experience during the last three years in a) identifying and securing federal appropriations; b) identifying and securing changes in federal legislation that have created new funding opportunities for a higher education client; c) assisting a higher education client in identifying and securing federal agency funding; and d) identifying and securing federal funding for a higher education client by forming a mutually advantageous consortium or partnership with other institutions or organizations.
  - c) Please describe the firm's experience in assisting higher education clients develop long-term strategic plans to secure federal funding.
  - d) Evidence demonstrating working relationships, or the ability to develop such relationships, with Connecticut's congressional delegation and staff as well as other congressional members and staff relevant to the CSUS's federal objectives.
  - e) Names, addresses, telephone numbers, and contact persons for 6 clients for whom the bidder has performed similar services during the past three years.
  - f) Resumes of senior personnel and of all those assigned to work with CSUS.
  - g) Provide information on the senior person(s) who will be the CSUS's contact and be dedicated to work with the CSUS as well as any other person(s) who will have substantial responsibility for such work. This information must include a description of their experience in providing these services and ability to build a successful relationship with the CSUS's administration. Detail what percentage of each individual's time would be spent working on the CSUS's account. Also indicate what other accounts on which this individual will be working.
  - h) Provide an organizational chart of the firm that includes all of the individuals who will be responsible for the CSUS's account.
  - i) The firm's history, including any disbarment from doing work with any State, Local or Federal governmental agencies. The firm shall provide to CSUS at the time of its proposal the nature of such disbarment and the final disposition of the case. CSUS will evaluate each

situation on its individual circumstances. Failure to disclose any related disbarment(s) to CSUS at the time of the submission of the proposal will result in the vendor's proposal being rejected.

## **8. Pricing Structure for the Proposal**

- a) Provide a price quote for an annual pricing for a three-year contract and potential annual extensions based on a monthly fee for the range of services needed to meet the objectives set forth in Sections I and III.
- b) Provide a schedule of fees and a description of how incidental costs will be charged to the CSUS.
- c) Provide a schedule of fees which could be used for billing services provided, which are above and beyond those proposed in response to above. (Note: Routing daily expenses are expected to be included in the monthly costs. Only costs for travel or expenses above and beyond normal should be considered reimbursable.) Any travel expenses must be in accordance with the CSUS Travel Policy.

### **Term of Contract**

1. The initial term of any contract resulting from this RFP will commence on date of award through 12/31/2010 (an initial 3 year time period). The parties thereto shall have the option to extend the contract for two (2) additional one (1) year periods, for a total term of approximately five (5) years. Said option to extend will only be exercised upon satisfactory performance and by mutual consent of both parties. The fee schedule(s) in any such extension option shall be based upon the original proposal plus any adjustments consistent with the Consumers Price Index for the preceding calendar year and subject to final negotiations between both parties.

#### Note:

Although the CSUS prefers to select only one firm to provide these services, the CSUS may accept proposals from firms that bid jointly. Additionally, the selected firm may subcontract for services, if prior written approval by the CSUS is granted.

If relevant, provide sample documents required by your company for the execution of a contract resulting from award of this proposal. Such sample documents must not include governing law statements for states or commonwealths other than Connecticut. Additionally, as an agency of a sovereign state, CSUS cannot indemnify vendors. Any resultant contract award shall incorporate this RFP as well as the awarded vendor's response. Please note that all proposals should include any applicable warranties of service, and should also include proposed language for termination procedures. Termination procedures shall include the following statement: "CSUS reserves the right to cancel the agreement without cause, with ten days written notice".

#### Vendor Selection Process:

- A. *Selection Committee.* A Selection Committee comprised of CSUS staff will evaluate qualified proposals submitted in response to this RFP and recommend finalists for consideration. The Selection Committee shall evaluate all proposals that meet the Submission Requirements.
- B. *Meetings with Proposers.* At its discretion, the CSUS may convene meetings with proposers in order to gain a fuller understanding of the proposals. The meetings may involve demonstrations, interviews, presentations, or site visits. If CSUS decides meetings are warranted, the CSUS will contact proposers to make an appointment. The RFP Selection Committee may, at its option, elect to “short-list” the number of proposers brought in for meetings based on the evaluation criteria included in this RFP. Please note that any costs incurred to meet the requirements of this RFP are to be borne by the proposer.
- C. *Contractor Selection.* It is the CSUS’s intention to notify the successful proposer by **12/31/07** and to initiate this engagement as soon as possible thereafter.

#### **Addendum:**

If it becomes necessary to revise any part of this RFP, notice of the revision will be given in the form of an addendum to all prospective proposers who are on record with the Purchasing Department as having received this RFP. All addenda shall become a part of this RFP. Receipt of addenda must be acknowledged by each proposer, and the failure of a proposer to acknowledge any addendum shall not relieve the proposer of the responsibility for complying with the terms thereof. The CSUS shall not be responsible for *oral* interpretations. All addenda shall be mailed or delivered to all that are known to have received the RFP and posted on the CSUS and State of Connecticut, Department of Administrative Services Purchasing portals located on their websites. No addenda shall be issued later than five days prior to the date for receipt of bids except an addendum, if necessary, postponing the date for receipt of bids or canceling the RFP.

“With regard to a state contract as defined in P.A. 07-1 having a value in a calendar year of \$50,000 or more or a combination or series of such agreements or contracts having a value of \$100,000 or more, the authorized signatory to this submission or response to the State’s solicitation expressly acknowledges receipt of the State Election Enforcement Commission’s notice advising prospective state contractors of

state campaign contribution and solicitation prohibitions, and will inform its principals of the contents of the notice.”

Submit completed state forms regarding nondiscrimination and affirmative action policies.

## **VI. General Instructions to Vendors**

Vendors who are furnished a copy of this RFP are requested to submit a receipt acknowledgement as soon as possible, to ensure timely receipt of potential corrections or cancellations. Those not intending to make a proposal are asked to submit a negative reply.

RFP responses must be in sealed envelopes upon which a clear indication has been made of the RFP reference title, as well as the date and time the bid is due. The vendor’s name and address must appear on the envelope.

All quotations shall be submitted on a guaranteed cost basis.

Vendor must answer all the questions and supply all materials required to be considered for award.

Any proposal submitted must include termination procedures, if either the contractor or CSUS determine that termination becomes necessary for reasons including but not limited to failure to perform.

The State of Connecticut is exempt from the payment of excise, transportation, and sales taxes imposed by the Federal government and/or the State of Connecticut. Such taxes must not be included in prices.

The proposal must be signed by an authorized official. The proposal must also provide the name, title, address and telephone number for individuals with authority to negotiate and contractually bind the company or individuals. Please provide the name and number of the person to contact for the purpose of clarifying the contract.

## **VII. Conditions**

**Any prospective contractor must be willing to adhere to the following conditions and must positively state them in the proposal:**

1. The State reserves the right to accept or reject any or all proposals or parts thereof submitted for consideration. All proposals will be kept sealed and safe until the date, time and place of public opening.
2. Any contract awarded as a result of this RFP must be in full conformance with statutory requirements of the State of Connecticut and the Federal Government.
3. All proposals in response to this RFP are to be the sole property of the State, and subject to the provisions of section 1-210 of the Connecticut General Statutes. (Re: Freedom of Information).
4. Any services, whether acceptable or unacceptable, developed under a contract awarded as a result of this RFP is to be sole property of the State of Connecticut unless stated otherwise in the RFP or contract.
5. All data collected by the contractor shall remain the sole property of Connecticut State University. Contractor is specifically barred from retaining and/or sharing any information obtained from this project, and acknowledges such in the proposal.
6. Any proposal must be valid for a period of 120 days from the due date.
7. Any alleged oral agreement or arrangement made by a firm with CSUS or any employee will be superseded by the written agreement.
8. CSUS reserves the right to amend or cancel this RFP, prior to the due date and time, if it is in the best interests of CSUS.
9. CSUS reserves the right to reject the proposal of any firm which is in default of any prior contract or for misrepresentation.
10. CSUS reserves the right to correct inaccurate awards resulting from its clerical errors.
11. Proposals are subject to rejection in whole or part if they limit or modify any of the terms and conditions and/or specifications of the RFP.
12. A vendor, if requested, must be prepared to present evidence of experience, ability, service facilities, and financial standing necessary to satisfactorily meet the requirements set forth or implied in the proposal.
13. The CSUS reserves the right to negotiate with any firm or firms, prior to award of this RFP as it deems in its best interest. Such negotiations will be a part of the final contract awarded under this RFP.

14. By responding, the vendor implicitly states that the proposal is not made in connection with any competing vendor submitting a separate response to the RFP, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud. It is further implied that the vendor did not participate in the RFP development process, had no knowledge of the specific contents of the RFP prior to its issuance, and that no employee of CSUS participated directly or indirectly in the vendor's proposal preparation.

15. Vendor shall bear all costs associated with Vendor's response to this request for proposal including the costs of any presentations and/or demonstrations (if any).

16. The proposal must include a summary of the bidder's experience with Affirmative Action. This information is to include a summary of the bidder's affirmative action plan and the bidder's affirmative action policy statement.

Regulations of Connecticut State Agencies Section 4-114a-3(10) requires agencies to consider the following factors when awarding a contract, which is subject to contract compliance requirements:

- a. the bidder's success in implementing an affirmative action plan;
- b. the bidder's success in developing an apprenticeship program complying with Section 46a-68-1 to 46a-68-17 of the Connecticut General Statutes, inclusive;
- c. The bidder's promise to develop and implement a successful Affirmative Action Plan;
- d. The bidder's submission of EE0-1 data indicating that the composition of its work force is at or nearby parity when compared to the racial and sexual composition of the work force in the relevant labor market area, and
- e. The bidder's promise to set aside a portion of the contract for legitimate small contractors and minority enterprises.

17. The State reserves the right to award in part, to reject any and all Proposals in whole or in part, to waive technical defects, irregularities and omissions if, in its judgment, the best interest of the State will be served.

## **VIII. Evaluation of Proposals**

Each proposal will be evaluated by a screening committee against the following criteria, to determine which vendor is most capable of implementing CSUS's requirements.

- Strength and relevance of experiences outlined in the proposal, including any supporting material presented by the firm or individual, including but not limited to:
  - a. identifying and securing federal appropriations for a higher education clients;
  - b. identifying and securing changes in federal legislation that would create new funding opportunities for the higher education client;

- c. identifying, creating, and securing new federal grant and contract opportunities for a higher education client;
  - d. identifying and securing federal funding for a higher education client by forming a mutually advantageous consortium or partnership with other institutions or organizations and
  - e. working with Master's 1 universities, or other institutions, similar to our four CSUS universities and
- Vendor's understanding of the project and its purpose and scope, as evidenced by the proposed approach and the level of effort
  - Competitiveness of proposed cost and demonstrated satisfaction of clients
  - Demonstration of commitment to affirmative action by full compliance with the regulations of the commission on Human Rights and Opportunities (CHRO).
  - A presentation to the screening committee may be requested.

## **XII. Terms and Conditions of the Personal Service Agreement (PSA)**

After an evaluation of all proposals the successful bidder and CSU shall enter a Personal Service Agreement (PSA) for the services outlined within this RFP governed by the Laws and Statutes of the State of Connecticut including the terms and conditions contained below.

**These terms and conditions are not subject to any changes or modifications.**

### **TERMS/CONDITIONS**

#### **EXECUTIVE ORDERS**

This contract is subject to the provisions of Executive Order No. Three of Governor Thomas J. Meskill promulgated June 16, 1971, and, as such, this contract may be canceled, terminated or suspended by the State Labor Commissioner for violation of or noncompliance with said Executive Order No. Three, or any state or federal law concerning nondiscrimination, notwithstanding that the Labor Commissioner is not a party to this contract. The parties to this contract, as part of the consideration hereof, agree that said Executive Order No. Three is incorporated herein by reference and made a party hereof. The parties agree to abide by said Executive Order and agree that the State Labor Commissioner shall have continuing jurisdiction in respect to contract performance in regard to nondiscrimination, until the contract is completed or terminated prior to completion. The contractor agrees, as part consideration hereof, that this contract is subject to the Guidelines and Rules issued by the State Labor Commissioner to implement Executive Order No. Three, and that he will not discriminate in his employment practices or policies, will



file all reports as required, and will fully cooperate with the State of Connecticut and the State Labor Commissioner. This contract is also subject to provisions of Executive Order No. Seventeen of Governor Thomas J. Meskill promulgated February 15, 1973, and, as such, this contract may be canceled, terminated or suspended by the contracting agency or the State Labor Commissioner for violation of or noncompliance with said Executive Order No. Seventeen, notwithstanding that the Labor Commissioner may not be a party to this contract. The parties to this contract, as part of the consideration hereof, agree that Executive Order No. Seventeen is incorporated herein by reference and made a part hereof. The parties agree to abide by said Executive Order and agree that the contracting agency and the State Labor Commissioner shall have joint and several continuing jurisdiction in respect to contract performance in regard to listing all employment openings with the Connecticut State Employment Service. This contract is also subject to provisions of Executive Order No. Sixteen of Governor John G. Rowland promulgated August 4, 1999, and, as such, this contract may be cancelled, terminated or suspended by the contracting agency of the State Labor Commissioner for violation of or noncompliance with said Executive Order No. Sixteen, notwithstanding that the Labor Commissioner may not be a party to this contract. The parties to this contract, as part of the consideration hereof, agree that Executive Order No. Sixteen is incorporated herein by reference and made a part hereof. The parties agree to abide by said Executive Order and agree that the contracting agency and the State Labor Commissioner shall have joint and several continuing jurisdiction in respect to contract performance in regard to listing all employment openings with the Connecticut State Employment Service.

## **I. NON-DISCRIMINATION**

(a). For the purposes of this section, "minority business enterprise" means any small contractor or supplier of materials fifty-one percent or more of the capital stock, if any, or assets of which is owned by a person or persons: (1) who are active in the daily affairs of the enterprise; (2) who have the power to direct the management and policies of the enterprise; and (3) who are members of a minority, as such term is defined in subsection (a) of Conn. Gen. Stat. subsection 32-9n; and "good faith" means that degree of diligence which a reasonable person would exercise in the performance of legal duties and obligations. "Good faith efforts" shall include, but not be limited to, those reasonable initial efforts necessary to comply with statutory or regulatory requirements and additional or substituted efforts when it is determined that such initial efforts will not be sufficient to comply with such requirements.

For purposes of this Section, "Commission" means the Commission on Human Rights and Opportunities.

For purposes of this Section, "Public works contract" means any agreement between any individual, firm or corporation and the state or any political subdivision of the state other than a municipality for construction, rehabilitation, conversion, extension, demolition or repair of a public building, highway or other changes or improvements in real property, or which is financed in whole or in part by the state, including but not limited to, matching expenditures, grants, loans, insurance or guarantees.

(b) (1) The Contractor agrees and warrants that in the performance of the contract such Contractor will not discriminate or permit discrimination against any person or group of persons on the grounds of race, color, religious creed, age, marital status, national origin, ancestry, sex, mental retardation or physical disability, including, but not limited to blindness, unless it is shown by such Contractor that such disability prevents performance of the work involved, in any manner prohibited by the laws of the United States or of the State of Connecticut. The Contractor further agrees to take affirmative action to insure that applicants with job related qualifications are employed and that employees are treated when employed without regard to their race, color, religious creed, age, marital status, national origin, ancestry, sex, mental retardation, or physical disability, including, but not limited to, blindness unless it is shown by the Contractor that such disability prevents performance of the work involved; (2) the Contractor agrees, in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the Contractor, to state that it is an "affirmative action - equal opportunity employer" in accordance with regulations adopted by the Commission; (3) the Contractor agrees to provide each labor union or representative of workers with which the Contractor has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding and each vendor with which the Contractor has a contract or understanding, a notice to be provided by the Commission, advising the labor union or workers' representative of the Contractor's commitments under

this section and to post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment; (4) the Contractor agrees to comply with each provision of this section and Conn. Gen. Stat. subsections 46a-68e and 46a-68f and with each regulation or relevant order issued by said Commission pursuant to Conn. Gen. Stat. subsections 46a-56, 46a-68e and 46a-68f; (b) the Contractor agrees to provide the Commission on Human Rights and Opportunities with such information requested by the Commission, and permit access to pertinent books, records and accounts, concerning the employment practices and procedures of the Contractor as relate to the provisions of this section and section 46a-56. If the Contract is a public works contract, the contractor agrees and warrants that he will make good faith efforts to employ minority business enterprises as subcontractors and suppliers of materials on such public works projects.

c. Determination of the Contractor's good faith efforts shall include, but shall not be limited to, the following factors: The Contractor's employment and subcontracting policies, patterns and practices; affirmative advertising, recruitment and training; technical assistance activities and such other reasonable activities or efforts as the Commission may prescribe that are designed to ensure the participation of minority business enterprises in public works projects.

d. The Contractor shall develop and maintain adequate documentation, in a manner prescribed by the Commission, of its good faith efforts.

e. The Contractor shall include the provisions of subsection (b) of this Section in every subcontract or purchase order entered into in order to fulfill any obligation of a contract with the State and such provisions shall be binding on a subcontractor, vendor or manufacturer unless exempted by regulations or orders of the Commission. The Contractor shall take such action with respect to any such subcontract or purchase order as the Commission may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions including sanctions for noncompliance in accordance with Conn. Gen. Stat. subsection 46a-56; provided, if such contractor becomes involved in, or is threatened with, litigation with a subcontractor or vendor as a result of such direction by the Commission, the Contractor may request the State of Connecticut to enter into any such litigation or negotiation prior thereto to protect the interests of the State and the State may so enter.

f. The Contractor agrees to comply with the regulations referred to in this Section as they exist on the date of this contract and as they may be adopted or amended from time to time during the term of this contract and any amendments thereto.

g. The Contractor agrees to follow the provisions: The contractor agrees and warrants that in the performance of the agreement such contractor will not discriminate or permit discrimination against any person or group of persons on the grounds of sexual orientation, in any manner prohibited by the laws of the United States or of the State of Connecticut, and that employees are treated when employed without regard to their sexual orientation; the contractor agrees to provide each labor union or representative of workers with which such contractor has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding and each vendor with which such contractor has a contract or understanding, a notice to be provided by the Commission on Human Rights and Opportunities advising the labor union or workers' representative of the contractor's commitments under this section, and to post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment; the contractor agrees to comply with each provision of this section and with each regulation or relevant order issued by said commission pursuant to Section 46a-56 of the general statutes; the contractor agrees to provide the Commission on Human Rights and Opportunities with such information requested by the commission, and permit access to pertinent books, records and accounts, concerning the employment practices and procedures of the contractor which relate to the provisions of this section and Section 46a-56 of the general statutes.

h. The Contractor shall include the provisions of the foregoing paragraph in every subcontract or purchase order entered into in order to fulfill any obligation of a contract with the state and such provisions shall be binding on a subcontractor, vendor or manufacturer unless exempted by regulations or orders of the commission. The contractor shall take such action with respect to any such subcontract or purchase order as the commission may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions including sanctions for noncompliance in accordance with Section 46a-56 of the general statutes; provided, if such contractor becomes involved in, or is threatened with, litigation with a subcontractor or vendor as a result

of such direction by the commission, the contractor may request the State of Connecticut to enter into any such litigation or negotiation prior thereto to protect the interests of the state and the state may so enter.

### **INSURANCE**

The contractor agrees that while performing services specified in this agreement he shall carry sufficient insurance (liability and/or other) as applicable according to the nature of the service to be performed so as to "save harmless" the State of Connecticut from any insurable cause whatsoever. If requested, certificates of such insurance shall be filed with the contracting State agency prior to the performance of services.

### **STATE LIABILITY**

The State of Connecticut shall assume no liability for payment for services under the terms of this agreement until the contractor is notified that this agreement has been accepted by the contracting agency and, if applicable, approved by the Office of Policy and Management (OPM) or the Department of Administrative Services (DAS) and by the Attorney General of the State of Connecticut.

## **IX. Rights Reserved to Connecticut State University System**

The Connecticut State University System reserves the right to award in part, reject any and all proposals in whole or in part, award to multiple contractors, to waive technical defects, irregularities and omissions if, in its judgment, the best interest of the CSUS is served. CSUS reserves the right to negotiate with any bidder prior to awarding a contract, and to negotiate with any contractor during the life of any subsequent contract.

**NOTICE TO EXECUTIVE BRANCH STATE CONTRACTORS AND  
PROSPECTIVE STATE CONTRACTORS OF CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTION AND  
SOLICITATION BAN**

This notice is provided under the authority of Connecticut General Statutes 9-612(g)(2), as amended by P.A. 07-1, and is for the purpose of informing state contractors and prospective state contractors of the following law (italicized words are defined below):

**Campaign Contribution and Solicitation Ban**

*No state contractor, prospective state contractor, principal of a state contractor or principal of a prospective state contractor, with regard to a state contract or state contract solicitation with or from a state agency in the executive branch or a quasi-public agency or a holder, or principal of a holder of a valid prequalification certificate, shall make a contribution to, or solicit contributions on behalf of (i) an exploratory committee or candidate committee established by a candidate for nomination or election to the office of Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, State Comptroller, Secretary of the State or State Treasurer, (ii) a political committee authorized to make contributions or expenditures to or for the benefit of such candidates, or (iii) a party committee;*

In addition, no holder or principal of a holder of a valid prequalification certificate, shall make a contribution to, or solicit contributions on behalf of (i) an exploratory committee or candidate committee established by a candidate for nomination or election to the office of State senator or State representative, (ii) a political committee authorized to make contributions or expenditures to or for the benefit of such candidates, or (iii) a party committee.

**Duty to Inform**

State contractors and prospective state contractors are required to inform their principals of the above prohibitions, as applicable, and the possible penalties and other consequences of any violation thereof.

**Penalties for Violations**

Contributions or solicitations of contributions made in violation of the above prohibitions may result in the following civil and criminal penalties:

Civil penalties--\$2000 or twice the amount of the prohibited contribution, whichever is greater, against a principal or a contractor. Any state contractor or prospective state contractor which fails to make reasonable efforts to comply with the provisions requiring notice to its principals of these prohibitions and the possible consequences of their violations may also be subject to civil penalties of \$2000 or twice the amount of the prohibited contributions made by their principals.

Criminal penalties—Any knowing and willful violation of the prohibition is a Class D felony, which may subject the violator to imprisonment of not more than 5 years, or \$5000 in fines, or both.

### **Contract Consequences**

Contributions made or solicited in violation of the above prohibitions may result, in the case of a state contractor, in the contract being voided.

Contributions made or solicited in violation of the above prohibitions, in the case of a prospective state contractor, shall result in the contract described in the state contract solicitation not being awarded to the prospective state contractor, unless the State Elections Enforcement Commission determines that mitigating circumstances exist concerning such violation.

The State will not award any other state contract to anyone found in violation of the above prohibitions for a period of one year after the election for which such contribution is made or solicited, unless the State Elections Enforcement Commission determines that mitigating circumstances exist concerning such violation.

#### Definitions:

"State contractor" means a person, business entity or nonprofit organization that enters into a state contract. Such person, business entity or nonprofit organization shall be deemed to be a state contractor until December thirty-first of the year in which such contract terminates. "State contractor" does not include a municipality or any other political subdivision of the state, including any entities or associations duly created by the municipality or political subdivision exclusively amongst themselves to further any purpose authorized by statute or charter, or an employee in the executive or legislative branch of state government or a quasi-public agency, whether in the classified or unclassified service and full or part-time, and only in such person's capacity as a state or quasi-public agency employee.

"Prospective state contractor" means a person, business entity or nonprofit organization that (i) submits a response to a state contract solicitation by the state, a state agency or a quasi-public agency, or a proposal in response to a request for proposals by the state, a state agency or a quasi-public agency, until the contract has been entered into, or (ii) holds a valid prequalification certificate issued by the Commissioner of Administrative Services under section 4a-100. "Prospective state contractor" does not include a municipality or any other political subdivision of the state, including any entities or associations duly created by the municipality or political subdivision exclusively amongst themselves to further any purpose authorized by statute or charter, or an employee in the executive or legislative branch of state government or a quasi-public agency, whether in the classified or unclassified service and full or part-time, and only in such person's capacity as a state or quasi-public agency employee.

"Principal of a state contractor or prospective state contractor" means (i) any individual who is a member of the board of directors of, or has an ownership interest of five per cent or more in, a state contractor or prospective state contractor, which is a business entity, except for an individual who is a member of the board of directors of a nonprofit organization, (ii) an individual who is employed by a state contractor or prospective state contractor, which is a business entity, as president, treasurer or executive vice president, (iii) an individual who is the chief executive officer of a state contractor or prospective state contractor, which is not a

business entity, or if a state contractor or prospective state contractor has no such officer, then the officer who duly possesses comparable powers and duties, (iv) an officer or an employee of any state contractor or prospective state contractor who has *managerial or discretionary responsibilities with respect to a state contract*, (v) the spouse or a *dependent child* who is eighteen years of age or older of an individual described in this subparagraph, or (vi) a political committee established or controlled by an individual described in this subparagraph or the business entity or nonprofit organization that is the state contractor or prospective state contractor.

"State contract" means an agreement or contract with the state or any state agency or any quasi-public agency, let through a procurement process or otherwise, having a value of fifty thousand dollars or more, or a combination or series of such agreements or contracts having a value of one hundred thousand dollars or more in a calendar year, for (i) the rendition of services, (ii) the furnishing of any goods, material, supplies, equipment or any items of any kind, (iii) the construction, alteration or repair of any public building or public work, (iv) the acquisition, sale or lease of any land or building, (v) a licensing arrangement, or (vi) a grant, loan or loan guarantee. "State contract" does not include any agreement or contract with the state, any state agency or any quasi-public agency that is exclusively federally funded, an education loan or a loan to an individual for other than commercial purposes.

"State contract solicitation" means a request by a state agency or quasi-public agency, in whatever form issued, including, but not limited to, an invitation to bid, request for proposals, request for information or request for quotes, inviting bids, quotes or other types of submittals, through a competitive procurement process or another process authorized by law waiving competitive procurement.

"Managerial or discretionary responsibilities with respect to a state contract" means having direct, extensive and substantive responsibilities with respect to the negotiation of the state contract and not peripheral, clerical or ministerial responsibilities.

"Dependent child" means a child residing in an individual's household who may legally be claimed as a dependent on the federal income tax of such individual.

"Solicit" means (A) requesting that a contribution be made, (B) participating in any fund-raising activities for a candidate committee, exploratory committee, political committee or party committee, including, but not limited to, forwarding tickets to potential contributors, receiving contributions for transmission to any such committee or bundling contributions, (C) serving as chairperson, treasurer or deputy treasurer of any such committee, or (D) establishing a political committee for the sole purpose of soliciting or receiving contributions for any committee. Solicit does not include: (i) making a contribution that is otherwise permitted by Chapter 155 of the Connecticut General Statutes; (ii) informing any person of a position taken by a candidate for public office or a public official, (iii) notifying the person of any activities of, or contact information for, any candidate for public office; or (iv) serving as a member in any party committee or as an officer of such committee that is not otherwise prohibited in this section.

**9. Definition of Small Contractor**

Section 4a-60g CONN. GEN. STAT. Defines a small contractor as a company that has been doing business under the same management and control and has maintained its principal place of business in Connecticut for a one year period immediately prior to its application for certification under this section, had gross revenues not exceeding ten million dollars in the most recently completed fiscal year, and at least fifty-one percent of the ownership of which is held by a person or persons who are

Job titles listed in this category include telephone operators, payroll clerks, bill and account collectors, customer service representatives, files clerks, dispatchers, shipping clerks, secretaries and administrative assistants, computer operators, mail clerks, and stock clerks.</p>	<p><b>BUILDING AND GROUNDS CLEANING AND MAINTENANCE:</b> This category includes occupations involving landscaping, housekeeping, and janitorial services. Job titles found in this category include supervisors of landscaping or housekeeping, janitors, maids, grounds maintenance workers, and pest control workers.</p> <p><b>CONSTRUCTION AND EXTRACTION:</b> This category includes construction trades and related occupations. Job titles found in this category include boilermakers, masons (all types), carpenters, construction laborers, electricians, plumbers (and related trades), roofers, sheet metal workers, elevator installers, hazardous materials removal workers, paperhangers, and painters. ## STANDARD TERMS AND CONDITIONS

### I. DEFINITIONS

The following words, when used herein, shall have the following meanings:

1. "Contract" shall mean any agreement negotiated by and between CSU and the contractor selected by CSUS as the result of a request for proposal, request for quotation, or request for bid, including, but not limited to, a personal service agreement or purchase order.
2. "CSU" shall refer to the Connecticut State University System, which is comprised of Central Connecticut State University, Eastern Connecticut State University, Southern Connecticut State University, Western Connecticut State University and the System Office, collectively and individually, as the context requires.
3. "Person" shall mean an individual, partnership, corporation or other business entity, as the context requires.
4. "Proposal" shall mean a response to a request for proposal, request for bid, or request for quotation.
5. "Proposer" shall mean a contractor that submits a response to a request for proposal, request for bid, or request for quotation.
6. "RFP" shall mean a request or invitation for proposal, bid, or quotation, as applicable.

### II. TERMS AND CONDITIONS RELATED TO REQUESTS FOR PROPOSALS

#### A. General Conditions

1. CSUS reserves the right to amend or cancel an RFP prior to the date and time for the opening of proposals. CSUS, in its sole discretion, reserves the right to accept or reject any and all proposals, in whole or in part, and to waive any technicality in any proposal submitted, and to accept any part of a proposal deemed to be in the best interest of CSUS.
2. Proposals received from proposers debarred by the State of Connecticut will not be considered for award.
3. CSUS does not commit to specific volumes of activity, nor does it guarantee the accuracy of statistical information provided in the RFP. Such information is supplied to proposers for reference only.
4. All responses to the RFP shall be and remain the sole property of CSUS.
5. Each proposer shall bear all costs associated with proposer's response to an RFP, including, but not limited to, the costs of any presentation and/or demonstration required by CSUS. In addition, answers or clarifications sought by CSUS arising out of or in connection with the proposal shall be furnished by the proposer at the proposer's expense.
6. CSUS reserves the right to negotiate, as it may deem necessary, with any or all of the proposers that submit proposals.
7. Any alleged oral agreement or arrangement made by any proposer with CSUS or any employee thereof shall not be binding.

#### B. Submission of Proposals

1. Proposals must be submitted on forms supplied by CSUS. Telephone, facsimile, or email proposals will not be accepted in response to an RFP.
2. The time and date proposals are to be received and opened are stated in each RFP issued by CSUS. Proposals received in the applicable CSUS purchasing department after the date and time specified in the RFP will be returned to the proposer unopened. Proposal amendments received by CSUS after the time specified for opening of proposals shall not be considered.
3. All proposals must be addressed to the location designated in the RFP. Proposal envelopes must clearly state the proposal number as well as the date and time of the opening of the proposals, as stated in the RFP. The name and address of the proposer must appear in the upper left hand corner of the envelope.
4. Proposals must be computer prepared, typewritten or handwritten in ink. Proposals submitted in pencil will be rejected.
5. Proposers must answer all the questions set forth in the RFP using the outline and numbering scheme set forth therein. Proposers must furnish all information requested in the RFP and supply all materials required for consideration. Failure of the proposer to answer all questions and supply all information and materials requested may be grounds for rejection of the proposal.
6. All proposals must be signed by a person duly authorized to sign proposals on behalf of the proposer. All signatures on the proposal must be original. Proposals bearing stamp signatures will be rejected. Unsigned proposals will be rejected.
7. Alterations or corrections to the proposal must be initialed by the person signing the proposal or his or her authorized designee. All initials on alterations or corrections to the proposal must be original. In the event that an authorized designee initials an alteration or correction, the proposer must submit a written authorization from the proposal's signatory to the authorized designee, authorizing the designee to make the alteration or correction. Failure to submit such an authorization shall result in rejection of proposal as to those items altered or corrected and not initialed.
8. Conditional proposals are subject to rejection in whole or in part, in the sole discretion of CSUS. A conditional proposal is defined as one that limits, modifies, expands or supplements any of the terms and conditions and/or specifications of the RFP.
9. Alternate proposals will not be considered by CSUS, unless otherwise noted on the RFP or on the proposal form. An alternate proposal is defined as one that is submitted in addition to the proposer's primary response to the RFP.
10. CSUS does not sponsor any one manufacturer's products, but lists equipment by name and model number to designate the quality and performance level desired. Proposers may propose substitutes similar in nature to the equipment specified. The substitute must, in the sole determination of CSUS, be equal in quality, durability, appearance, strength and design to the equipment or product specified in the RFP, or offer a clear advantage to CSUS because of improved or superior performance. All proposals including equipment or product substitutes must be accompanied with current descriptive literature on, and data substantiating, the equal or superior nature of the substitute. All final decisions concerning substitutes will be made by CSUS prior to any award. The word substitute shall not be construed to permit substantial departure from the detailed requirements of the specifications.

11. Each proposer's prices must be firm for a period up to 120 days from date of the opening of proposals. Prices must be extended in decimal, not fraction, must be net, and must include transportation and delivery charges, fully prepaid by the contractor, to the destination specified in the proposal, and subject only to cash discount.
12. Pursuant to Section 12-412 of the Connecticut General Statutes, the State of Connecticut is exempt from the payment of excise, transportation and sales taxes imposed by the Federal Government and/or the State. Accordingly, such taxes must not be included in proposal prices.
13. If there is a discrepancy between a unit price and an extended price, the unit price will govern.
14. By submitting a proposal, the proposer asserts that the offer and information contained therein is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud and was not made in connection with any competing proposer's submission of a separate response to the RFP. By submitting a proposal, the proposer further asserts that it neither participated in the formation of CSUS's solicitation development process nor had any knowledge of the specific contents of the RFP prior to its issuance, and that no employee of CSUS participated directly or indirectly in the preparation of the proposer's proposal.
15. It is the proposer's responsibility to check the website of the State of Connecticut Department of Administrative Services ([www.das.state.ct.us/Purchase/Portal/Portal\\_Home.asp](http://www.das.state.ct.us/Purchase/Portal/Portal_Home.asp)) for changes prior to the proposal opening. It is the responsibility of the proposer to obtain all information related to proposal submission including, without limitation, any and all addenda or supplements required.
16. Any person contemplating submitting a proposal who is in doubt as to the true meaning of, or is in need of clarification of, any part of the RFP or the specifications set forth therein, must submit a written request for clarification to CSUS. The proposer may rely only upon a response to a request for clarification set forth in writing by CSUS.
17. Proposals for the provision of services must include the cost of obtaining all permits, licenses, and notices required by the city or town in which the services is to be provided, and the State and Federal governments..
18. Each proposer must complete and submit with its proposal the following non-discrimination and affirmative action forms: the Notification to Proposers, Contract Compliance, and EEO-1. It shall not be sufficient to declare or state that such forms are on file with the State of Connecticut. Failure to include the required forms shall result in rejection of the proposal.

#### C. Samples

1. Samples, when required by the RFP, must be submitted strictly in accordance with the requirements of the RFP.
2. Any and all required samples shall be furnished by the proposer at no cost to CSUS. All samples, unless otherwise indicated, will become the property of CSUS and will not be returned to the proposer unless the proposer states in the proposal that the sample's return is requested. A sample will be returned on the request of the proposer if the sample has not been rendered useless or beyond its useful life. The proposer must pay the costs associated with the return of any sample. Samples may be held by CSUS for comparison with actual product deliveries.
3. The making of chemical and physical tests of samples submitted with proposals shall be made in the manner prescribed by CSUS.

#### D. Bonding Requirements / Guaranty or Surety: As per requirements in this RFP.

### III. CONTRACT AWARD

1. All proposals properly submitted will be opened and read publicly. Upon award, the proposals are subject to public inspection. CSUS will not prepare abstracts of proposals received for distribution, nor will information concerning the proposals received be conveyed by telephone.
2. Award will be made to the lowest responsible qualified proposer who complies with the proposal requirements. Price alone need not be the sole determining factor for an award. Other criteria, listed in the RFP, may be considered by CSUS in the award determination.
3. CSUS reserves the right to grant an award and/or awards by item, or part thereof, groups of items, or all items of the proposal and to waive minor irregularities and omissions if, in CSUS's judgment, the best interests of CSUS or the State of Connecticut will be served.
4. CSUS reserves the right to correct inaccurate awards resulting from its administrative errors.
5. The Award Notice and Offer (to enter into a formal contract) shall be sent to the awarded proposer by first class certified mail, return receipt requested, to the address provided in the awarded proposal, or by overnight courier. The Notice and Offer shall constitute an offer by CSUS to enter into negotiations to come to a formal contract agreement. If the proposer, within ten (10) business days of receipt of said Notice and Offer, declines to begin contract negotiations, then the offer to negotiate a contract may be withdrawn and an offer to negotiate a contract extended to the next lowest responsible qualified proposer, and so on until a contract is negotiated and executed.
6. Each proposal submitted shall constitute an offer by the proposer to furnish any or all of the commodities or services described therein at the prices given and in accordance with conditions set forth in the proposal, the RFP, and these "Standard Terms and Conditions." Acceptance and resulting contract formation shall be in a formal written document authorized by CSUS's Purchasing Department and where applicable, approved by the Attorney General, and shall comprise the entire agreement between the proposer and CSUS.

### IV. TERMS AND CONDITIONS RELATED TO CONTRACT WITH SUCCESSFUL PROPOSER

By submitting a response to the RFP, the proposer agrees that any contract negotiated between it (if the successful proposer), as contractor, and CSUS may contain the following provisions, as deemed applicable by CSUS:

#### A. General Conditions

1. Any product developed and accepted by CSUS under a contract awarded as a result of an RFP shall be sole property of CSUS, unless stated otherwise in the contract.
2. Data collected or obtained by the contractor in connection with the performance of the contract shall not be shared with any third party without the express written approval of CSUS.
3. The contractor shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless CSUS, its officers and employees, against any and all suits, actions, legal or administrative proceedings, claims, demands, damages, liabilities, monetary loss, interest, attorney's fees, costs and expenses of whatsoever kind or nature arising out of the performance of the agreement, including those arising out of injury to or death of contractor's employees or subcontractors, whether arising before, during or after completion of the services thereunder and in any manner directly or indirectly caused, occasioned or contributed to in whole or in part, by reason of any act, omission, fault or negligence of contractor or its employees, agents or subcontractors. Without limiting the foregoing, the contractor shall defend, indemnify and hold CSUS and the State of Connecticut harmless from liability of any kind for the use of any copyright or un-copyrighted composition, secret process, patented or unpatented invention furnished or used in the performance of the contract. This indemnification shall be in addition to the warranty obligations of the contractor and shall survive the termination or cancellation of the contract or any part thereof.
4. The contractor shall: (i) guarantee its products against defective materials and workmanship; (ii) repair damage of any kind, for which it is responsible, to CSUS's premises or equipment, to its own work or to the work of other contractors; (iii) obtain and pay for all applicable licenses, permits, and notices; (iv) give all notices and comply with all requirements of the municipality in which the service is to be provided and of the State and federal governments; and (v) carry proper and sufficient insurance to protect the State from loss.
5. The contract shall be interpreted and governed by the laws of the State of Connecticut, without regard to its principles of conflicts of laws.
6. The contractor agrees that it shall be subject to and abide by all applicable federal and state laws and regulations.
7. The contractor agrees that it shall comply with Section 4a-60 of the Connecticut General Statutes and with Executive Orders Nos. 3, 16, 17 and 7C.

8. The contractor agrees that the sole and exclusive means for the presentation of any claim against the State of Connecticut, the Connecticut State University or the Board Of Trustees arising from a contract with CSUS, shall be in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 53 of the Connecticut General Statutes (Claims Against the State) and that no additional legal proceedings will be initiated in any state or federal court in addition to, or in lieu of, said Chapter 53 proceedings.
9. The contractor agrees that CSUS shall have and retain sole and exclusive right and title in and to the forms, maps, and/or materials produced for CSUS pursuant to the contract, including all rights to use, distribute, sell, reprint, or otherwise dispose of same. The contractor further agrees that it shall not copyright, register, distribute, or claim any rights in or to said maps and/or materials or the work produced under the contract.
10. The contractor or subcontractor, as applicable, shall offer and agree to assign to CSUS all rights, title and interest in and to all causes of action it may have under Section 4 of the Clayton Act, 15 U.S.C. 15, or under Chapter 624 of the general statutes, arising from the purchase of services, property or intangibles of any kind pursuant to a public purchase contract or subcontract; such assignment shall be made and become effective at the time the contract is executed by the parties, without further acknowledgment by them.
11. The contractor shall not assign or otherwise dispose of the contract or its right, title or interest therein, or its power to execute such contract, to any other person without the prior written consent of CSUS.
12. CSUS reserves the right to inspect commodities for conformance with proposal specifications. When commodities are rejected by CSUS, said commodities shall be removed by the contractor, at the contractor's expense, from the CSUS premises within forty-eight (48) hours after notification of such rejection, unless public health and safety require immediate destruction or other disposal of such rejected delivery. Rejected items left longer than forty-eight (48) hours shall be considered abandoned by the contractor and CSUS shall have the right to dispose of them as its own property.
13. If any provision, term or condition of the contract is prohibited, invalid, or unenforceable then that provision, term or condition shall be ineffective to the extent of the prohibition, invalidity, or prohibition without invalidating the remaining provisions, terms and conditions unless it materially alters the nature or intent thereof.
14. Should the terms of any purchase order or invoice issued in connection with the contract conflict with the terms of the contract, the terms of the contract shall prevail.
15. Failure of the contractor to deliver commodities or perform services as specified in the contract will constitute authority for CSUS to purchase these commodities or services on the open market. The contractor shall promptly reimburse CSUS for excess costs incurred by CSUS due to these purchases, and these purchases shall be deducted by CSUS from the quantities contracted for.
16. No right or duty, in whole or in part, of the contractor under the contract may be assigned or delegated without the prior written consent of CSUS. The subcontracting or assignment of any of contractor's obligations under the contract to a subcontractor shall require the prior written approval of CSUS.
17. Upon termination of the contract by CSUS, the contractor shall both immediately discontinue all services (unless the notice directs otherwise) and deliver to CSUS all data, drawings, specifications, reports, estimates, summaries, and such other information and materials as may have been accumulated by the contractor in performing its duties under the contract, whether completed or in progress. All such documents, information, and materials shall become the property of CSUS.
18. The State of Connecticut shall assume no liability for payment for services under the terms of the contract until the contractor is notified that the contract has been accepted by CSUS and, if applicable, approved by the Office of Policy and Management ("OPM") or the Department of Administrative Services ("DAS") and by the Attorney General of the State of Connecticut.

**D. Delivery**

1. Unless otherwise specified in the proposal, all products and equipment delivered pursuant to the contract shall be new and shall include any and all manufacturer's warranties.
2. Delivery shall be to the point specified in the contract.
3. All deliveries shall display, in plain sight, any related Purchase Order or Reference/Delivery Number. Failure to display said number may cause the shipment to be rejected and returned at the contractor's expense.
4. All deliveries shall be in compliance with Sections 22a-194 to 22a-194g of the Connecticut General Statutes related to product packaging.
5. Deliveries shall be subject to reweighing on official sealed scales designated by the State and payment shall be made on the basis of net weight of materials received.
6. Payment terms are net forty-five (45) days after receipt of goods or invoice, whichever is later. State of Connecticut certified small or minority contractors are payable under terms net thirty (30) days.
7. Monies owed to CSUS or the Department of Revenue Services (DRS) by the contractor shall be deducted from current obligations.

**E. Inspection and Tests**

1. The inspection of all commodities and the making of chemical and physical tests of samples of deliveries to determine whether or not the contract specifications are being complied with shall be made in the manner prescribed by CSUS.
2. Any item that fails in any way to meet the terms or specifications set forth in the contract is subject to be paid for at an adjusted price or rejected, in the discretion of CSUS.
3. After delivery and installation of any equipment provided pursuant to the contract, the contractor shall certify to CSUS that the equipment has been properly installed and is ready for use. Thereafter, for a test period of sixty (60) days, CSUS shall operate the system in accordance with its normal operating practices. The acceptance test shall determine if the equipment's operating characteristics meet the performance standards set forth in the contract.

**F. Advertising**

Reference by the contractor to sales to CSUS for advertising and promotional purposes without the prior approval of CSUS shall be expressly prohibited.
